




Kevin the Butterfly

Refresh memory


Teacher reread the story "Kevin the Caterpillar" and reminded children Kevin by asking them to take the role of a caterpillar.





Art and Craft

Children found that Kevin the Caterpillar is not playing hide and seek with them. He had turned into a butterfly in the new story. They built a garden for Kevin. And they created their own butterfly by renaming it.

Shared reading - Share the pleasure of reading

Language is learned and developed through interactions in meaningful context. Children learn through reading "Kevin the butterfly" with different reading strategies, followed by various language learning activities, which include storytelling "Where's Spot?", creative thinking "Where is Kevin the Caterpillar?", art and craft etc.

Children's motivation in learning has been promoting activities after activities. They responded actively. Some receptive and expressive sentences, such as "Where is...?", "It is here!", "It is not here!", "What do you think?" "Let's have a look." etc had been developed for children's daily conversation.

Moreover, drama activities are seen as a language-based art form, as well as a social art form, requiring children to work together to create. They help children express their feelings, emotions and imagination, which help children to build self-confidence in speaking English.

To develop a love and positive attitude towards learning English is the ultimate goal of Shared Reading Approach. In this way, children enjoy reading. And they appreciate learning through reading.
